- Security, familiarity, control
- Process & product
- Structures of opportunities
- Socioculturally specific (Hart, 2017; Savaş, 2014)
 - → Home cultures
- Institutionally restricted & adjusted (Goffman, 1961; also Scott-Smith, 2020)

Ghassan Hage (2013) "political economies of being"

- Modes & practices of life maintenance
- Having (*hexis*) & being (*habitus*)
 become indistinguishable
- Process of creating homes as accumulation of being




Translations

- Lat. trans 'across' and latio 'carrying'
- Attempt of consistency through transformation to settle on same meaning (Latour 1999, p. 58)
 - → Mobilizing means of home (across borders)
- Affective, dynamic, multi-directed, conditioned
- Thing (co-)create social positions




Dispossessions: destructions or negations of means of social reproduction


- "dismaterial" phenomenon
- various direct & indirect forms (warzones, displacement & asylum reception)
- accumulation
 - → chronic predicaments
 - → "all-taking"

- I. Translating home arrangements
- enclosure/ minimal privacy, normalcy & comfort
- reassembling fragments of homes (Conlon, 2011)
- means of coping (social isolation) & connecting
- material & spatial reception limitations
- material array important in itself

II. Communal homing

- sense of home by 'dense moments' (Abels, 2019)
- material culture secondary
- social interaction, binding & outreaching (Vandevoordt, 2017)
- conflicts with site regimes likely

Case study tableware quarrels:

- quarrel over essentials of a minimal home considered undignifying
- site-regime controls constrain visits
- material home efforts stalled
- family relies reluctantly on tableware of neighbor

III: Translations of individual and profession-oriented practices

- adapting self to "successful" arrival, above all education (Lems, 2019)
- → self as subject & object
- calm & focus required
- material social aspects of home postponed
- disturbance in centers
 → use of public spaces



"dismaterial", multiple & accumulative


 three forms of translative homing in asylum reception I. arrangement-based II. communality-based III. individually-focused

 & their accumulations beyond 'displacement'


