- Tutors and student mentors





The Politico/Historical Milieu –

- The later years of the 9th century CE, after Caliph al-Mutawakkil (r. 847-861) – political and military power of the Abbasid caliphs, regional centers, government; emirs & sultans rule independently, often theoretically the caliph's vassals

Adapting eTeaching to an international audience

Three Examples

Make people **see** each other.

Collaboration is crucial to successfull learning outcomes for students

Some catch rules of expectation management
